

The Address From Simon


A parable to illustrate the freedom which Christmas and New Year bring:

FUND RAISING

The funding group has been looking widely at the issue of fund raising in St. Peter's for both the general upkeep of our beautiful building and its focus of faith in Huddersfield. We have also been looking at the soon

to begin 'North Wall Project' – restoration of stone work, some drainage work and windows refurbishment beginning in the Spring. We have to match-fund a large grant from English Heritage and are looking to raise money towards our contribution.

The funding group has looked at different parts within the church family; from those who are home members, to the various congregations - Sundays and Wednesdays; to those who see St. Peter's as their spiritual centre and call in during the week. How to focus fundraising from within our own family of the church and also outward into the town and community.

Whilst considering smaller ongoing fund raising initiatives that **Home Groups** or **Individuals** could become involved in, the following initiatives have been suggested and are in the process of beginning – if you have a talent in some area or other please offer your services or take up an offer to be involved:

Card making – ongoing throughout the year by Hilary Norcliffe (and other volunteers). Please save your used Christmas /Birthday/Easter cards to be recycled into cards or gift tags.

Home produce – Jams, pickles, etc, these can be made at appropriate times throughout the year and stored in church awaiting coffee mornings/Fairs etc.,

Cakes/home baking, these can be offered at coffee mornings or for sale after Sunday services.

Fruit/veg - home grown excess can be offered for sale after Sunday services.







Knitting/sewing/crafts – for events i.e Easter bunnies, Christmas fair (all contributions gratefully received).

Request – has anyone got the Easter bunnies/chicken knitting pattern?

Jewellery making - yet to be explored!

Calligraphy – to be explored

Plant/bulb planting – A request for ceramic bowls from congregation to reuse in Autumn for preparation for Christmas Fair.

Two New Year Initiatives

Small tubes will be available for distribution to each member of the congregation early January 2012 for coin collection inviting us to return them when full or on a specific date – we thought the monthly Coffee Morning Plus or indeed any Sunday service would be good points of contact. Small pots of small copper or silver coins would soon make significant contributions.

An Evening After Burns Night - Whisky Tasting and Haggis Supper. An evening of food and whisky tasting; from light and smooth lowland to some peaty and flavorsome brands.

Tickets will be £20 with supper and five measures to try during the evening.

If you would like to sponsor a whisky course please speak to the Vicar.




HUDDERSFIELD MISSION

Hopefully this winter you will be able to keep warm and dry; however, this will not be the experience of everyone in Huddersfield. At the Mission, we are aware of the increasing need to help and support those who are struggling and that this is likely to increase as the winter draws in. There are two new initiatives based at the Mission for which we would welcome **your** support.

Evening use of the Café

This idea emerged from the recent *No Room...* event at the Mission which drew together 65 people from 19 churches across Huddersfield to discuss the issue of homelessness.

The plan is to open the Café on evenings between 6-10 pm in January and February 2012. This will be in order to provide a place of warmth and safety for those who would value that space. During the evening warm food and drinks would be offered, but there would also be the opportunity for conversation, games and making friends.



We are seeking volunteers who would like to be involved with catering or to talk with guests. We need a minimum of three volunteers each evening and availability will determine how often we will be able to open the Café in the evenings.

Would you be willing and able to offer one or more evenings in January and February to help?

If so, please pick up a volunteer form from the Mission or contact Rev. Stephen Day. Volunteers will all be given an hour's training to ensure that they are happy with their role.

Welfare Fund

At the moment in the Café we are encountering a number of people who need overnight accommodation but have nowhere to go because all the hostels are full. With the onset of winter this need is going to grow, but there is currently no fund from which we can draw to pay for accommodation. Similarly, there is no fund from which we can support people who urgently need to top up their gas and electricity. Please note that it is not our intention to give out money to anyone.

We plan to establish a Welfare Fund at the Mission which can be drawn upon as required for the needs outlined above.

Would you and/or your church be able to contribute to this Welfare Fund?

All donations will be gratefully received. You could consider a one-off donation or possibly a monthly one. If it is possible to Gift Aid donations this would increase the value to the Welfare Fund.


If you are able to claim Winter Fuel Payment but do not need this allowance to pay your fuel bills, you might consider offering it to the Welfare Fund. In this way, it could be used to support those for whom it would make a real difference in being able to stay warm this winter.

Please note that the Welfare Fund is intended as an interim measure whilst consideration is made of other means of supporting the vulnerable. Details of this further provision will be shared in due course.

Diocesan Lent Appeal 2012

As you will know each year I invite the parishes of our Diocese to support two charitable causes one connected with our Tanzanian Link and the other a local charity.

In Tanzania we are supporting our three link dioceses – Mara, Tarime and Rorya – in a new project to enable the development of *Microfinance*. This is a way of improving the quality of life of individuals and communities by enabling the provision of accessible and affordable financial and social services. Micro-finance provides a route out of absolute poverty and increases the health and educational options for poor people. For example, a young mother could take up the opportunity of borrowing money from the micro-finance initiative in order to set up her own cottage industry as a seamstress. She could not get funding from a bank, and loan sharks are too dangerous, but micro-finance provides a way forward for her.

The second charity we are supporting is the **Barnsley Churches Drugs Project.** The project is run by volunteers offering a warm and welcoming place to sit, with free hot drinks and food. The project is for adults, homeless people, and people with drug and alcohol problems. The drop-in sessions are held in the hall at St. Peter's Church. The project has a dedicated team of forty volunteers and their hard work and determination has seen the project exist for nine years. Funding the project has been increasingly hard yet the need for the project ever increases.

I hope you will agree that these are worthwhile projects to be supporting and may I thank you for all your support in advance?

THANK YOU

In December, Simon sent out thank-you cards to all the people who regularly make donations to the church through bank standing orders or through the envelope scheme. These are the donations recorded by the church, mainly for gift aid calculations. To those of you who give cash regularly and are thus not recorded, we are equally grateful.

It is a requirement of the Inland Revenue to record all our donations to provide audit trails. For those of you who are interested, the recording schemes used by the church have evolved from hand written lists into computer systems but even these are still quite laborious. Money received through the banks ie standing orders, cheques etc are recorded by the church administrator (Paula) into a DOS based accounting system. It works but is now very limited. Money received by the envelope scheme is counted by the Wardens and recorded, again by Paula, into an Excel spreadsheet. Money in pew envelopes is counted by the Wardens and recorded temporarily by me the Gift Aid Officer into the church database which holds names, addresses etc on everyone who has provided such information. Data is extracted from all these systems by yours truly in order to create these thank-you cards or to make gift aid claims, or any other lists which may be required periodically. Are you still with me? Oh for a more modern simplified software system.

CONFIDENTIALITY.

Throughout the whole of these processes, confidentiality is maintained. Only two people have full access to all of the information we record ie me and Paula. Even the Vicar does not have access to this information. To create the cards, I provided Simon with the list of names only. He then produced addressed envelopes and the signed cards with blanks for the money. Paula and I then inserted the money paid and gift aid

received and sealed them into the envelopes. So you see the lengths we go to to preserve the confidentiality.





NEWS FROM YOUR PCC

We are getting nearer to solving the problem of what to do to commemorate the service which the Livingstones had given to the Parish Church. A stained glass expert is being consulted with a view to costing the design and implementation of an engraved roundel in one of the church windows.

We are to get a new curate. We welcome the Rev Marion Russel in January. Although already a priest, she needs to serve additional time as a curate in a parish. Also Anna is to be licensed at the same time to preach here.

The work done in St Peter's Gardens, clearing several of the large trees, has increased the natural light in the church and it has been noted that antisocial activity in the area has decreased.

As a result of the shortfall in our income the PCC have reluctantly decided to defer our charitable giving this year. It is hoped that next year we will make this up.

The North Wall Project

Stage 1 of this work is now completed ie investigation, producing detailed plans, obtaining quotations, applying for grants etc. So far we will be getting £155K from English Heritage but this will only cover half what we will be requiring so Stage 2 is to be split into two phases with the hope of getting more grants later.

Phase 1 will hopefully start in March and covers the two vestry roofs, a roof security system, the drains, some of the stonework and urgent glazing. **Phase 2** will cover the rest.
